DEAN'S MESSAGE

The revised mission statement of the American Guild of Organists includes "the nurture of future generations of organists." How has the Binghamton Chapter addressed this mission? You may recall that we gave Sarah Sabol some financial assistance towards her study of organ performance at Interlochen Arts Academy. In June 2012 we sponsored a Rising Stars Recital featuring Sarah and Nathaniel Efthimiou. Sarah is now a freshman at Rice University, studying with Ken Cowan, and Nathaniel is a junior at Houghton College, majoring in composition and studying organ with Judy Congdon.

In the spring we will host a <u>Pedals, Pipes and Pizza</u> event for the first time. This program is designed to introduce young people to the organ. John Holt, Joan Kellam, Ellie Rugg and I met a few days ago to begin planning. The United Presbyterian Church has invited us to hold the event there. The date is yet to be finalized, but in the meantime, you can be thinking of young people who could profit from this experience. While the session will focus on grades 4-8, younger and older persons will not be excluded. Since this is a "hands-on" experience, some knowledge of the piano keyboard will be required. So that everyone has time to sit at the console, enrollment will be limited to ten. More details will follow, so stay tuned.

The October Chapter event will be an Armchair Organ Tour of organs you may never have an opportunity to visit in person. Widor: A Life beyond the Toccata by John R. Near

John Near finished writing his comprehensive biography of Charles-Marie Widor late last year after many years of research. The book has been widely praised and Near received a well-deserved award this year from the Organ Historical society at its national convention. I got the book as an early Father's Day present and have just finished it (!). It is 612 pages, with 96 pages of interesting notes, complete listings of Widor's literary and musical works, as well as an extensive research bibliography.

Widor was much more than an organist and organ composer. He wrote an astounding amount of music for opera, chamber music, symphony orchestras, and solo piano, in addition to the 10 organ symphonies we all know and love. Aside from his position of titular organist at St. Sulpice in Paris (for over 60 years!), he was known and revered internationally as a recitalist and conductor. He was one of the most prominent professors in the Paris Conservatory and was a central figure in the artistic culture of Paris and France.

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Restoration of the Henry Purcell Organ

It was serendipity.

It had been a few years since I had built a new organ for the "new" (1840's) Saint Paul's Church. We had talked a few times about providing an organ for the Old Narragansett Church, the previous building, built in 1706 and the oldest Anglican Church building in the US north of the Potomac.

When the call came, it happened that I had just heard of the availability of this organ, of which little was known other than it dated from the 17th century.

In appallingly poor condition, we restored it to its c. 1680 state. My research has established that it was built by a member of the Dallam family, utilizing pipes from the earliest years of the century, for John Playford. Playford is best known for his dance music, but was also Henry Purcell's publisher. Evidence strongly suggests that the organ passed to Purcell when rebuilt, also by the Dallam's, c. 1685. It was probably used at the coronation of James II.
