HOW TO GROW YOUR CHOIR!

You won't want to miss Binghamton AGO's April event on Sunday the 19th at a new time: **4:00 p.m.** This will allow you to get home a little earlier. We have been invited to have our workshop at Holy Nativity Lutheran Church . . . and hope to see you and members of your choirs there full force.

Our guest clinician is MICHAEL LUBY. Michael is a music educator and vocalist native to New York's Capital District. He is a graduate of the Crane School of Music, Potsdam, and has just retired from the music department of the Troy City Schools. Michael is personable and dynamic and will share with you his secrets of good vocal technique, as well as tips on how to grow and hold the interest of your choirs.

Michael was a founding member of Opera Excelsior of Albany and Albany Pro Musica and was in the Chorus of Lake George Opera. He has sung with the New York City Choral Artists as well as with the New York Philharmonic. Currently he is part of the well-known "Voices of Cooperstown" and last summer celebrated his 250th performance with Glimmerglass Opera. Michael leads the tenor section of the choir at Christ Episcopal Church, Cooperstown, NY, where Roberta Rowland-Raybold now serves as Organist/Choirmaster.
