DEAN'S MESSAGE...

Many of you reading this heard Randy Steere's concert a couple of weeks ago. If you weren't able to be there, or able to attend his presentation the following morning, let me summarize a bit. His program focused on what could be called "accessible" music, pieces with obvious or well-known melodies and relatively little dissonance. Randy introduced each piece to help the audience appreciate the music and what he felt was significant or engaging about them.

During the Saturday workshop, Randy's main point was that organists have become "insular" and too intellectual in our programming. Organ concerts are too often designed to appeal to other organists, or dedicated church-goers (both of which are rather narrow audiences, and mostly shrinking). Or perhaps people who majored in music in college, rather than the broader population.

He showed an ad for an event at the Bedford Whaling Museum, a Moby Dick Marathon, and asked which of these aspects of the program would appeal to us: 25 hour live reading of Melville's book ... a live enactment of Chapter 40 (which was scheduled for midnight) ... discussions with experts, etc.

We felt it didn't have a "hook" for a general audience., too focused on specialists or people who already are deep into the book or whaling history. It didn't seem like it would be interactive enough. He feels the same is true for most organ concerts, and a lot of the music many organists play - too intellectual, no familiar melodies, and few rhythm patterns that ordinary people can recognize. - not interactive, just auditory (barely engages visual if the console is even visible).

The big challenge is to get people to come to a concert in the first place. And then it has to reach them where they are. His suggestions: short selections (4-5 minutes max) ... broad mix of styles and genres (he highlighted Arthur Fiedler and the Boston Pops as an example that gets people "in the door") ... pieces should appeal without having to be analyzed or studied (but brief explanation before playing can make them accessible) ... collaborate with other musicians, dancers, film, etc. (I remember an organ concert with light show in the 1970's, huge audience) ... develop a theme which has a "hook" to get people's attention ... don't assume audience is religious, but "spiritual" and mutual caring is good ... find ways for audience to participate (hands on, maybe let people try playing the organ afterwards).

He highlighted a few organists who are doing things we should consider emulating (or expanding upon):one uses pre-programed digital percussion in his concerts....Paul Fey posts short videos on YouTube with attention-grabbing descriptions (also Anna Lapwood, Richard McVeigh, others)...an organist who challenges kids to create videos for a short organ piece he has recorded for them, then plays the piece to the films that are submitted.

Myself, I'd say that certain pieces by Widor, Vierne and Dupré would fit the model he proposes, even Mendelssohn, and yes, certain pieces by JS Bach. Overall, it was a very thought-provoking concert and workshop, which I hope will influence our chapter programming going forward. Speaking of which, please sign up to play in our Members' Recital which is on June 2 (a week earlier than originally planned). See page 2 for further information. Dinner at Little Venice will follow for members and quests.


